

NONPROFIT STATUS

We recently submitted our application to attain 501(c) 3 status with the IRS. The process takes a long time but when it is completed we will be a nonprofit entity and will be able to apply for grants without involving a fiscal agent, among other things. Thanks to Nate for preparing this application. The paperwork is about the size of a small book and without his expertise it probably would not have been done anytime soon.

IOWA ARCHITECTS VISIT

On October 8th, two architects from Des Moines visited us to gather input for the community design program they will be designing for our neighborhood. This "charrette" was held at the public library and included several city officials and historians. During their afternoon visit, they also walked our streets, hills and all, to take an up close and personal look at the area. After all that, they met with many of us in the evening at Kyle and Cindy's house, where we enjoyed our usual good food. We have asked them to design a way of making our NA appear more cohesive visually—we already are cohesive in the more important ways (friends, all). Some ideas that were discussed were ways to make the entryways to our neighborhood more attractive and informational so folks know when they enter our area, and installation of poles throughout that could contain solar or LED lighting and places for large banners, flower baskets and other holiday décor. They will meet with other architectural volunteers in Des Moines over the next month and will return to Council Bluffs on Friday, November 5th, with their final presentation. We will find a meeting place (The Center has been recommended) and we encourage everyone to come so we can see their vision for the future appearance of our streetscapes. We'll let you know where. The participation of the IAF in this project was funded by Iowa West Foundation.

Grant Wood Lecture Series

The Bluffs Arts Council's Grant Wood Lecture Series will conclude with a very interesting and relative topic regarding the internationally famous Iowan painter. The lecture series coincides with the organization's Chieftain Hotel Iowa Corn Room Restoration Project and is intended to provide further education with regard to the artist who left his footprint in Council Bluffs in the late 1920's.

On Wednesday, October 20th, Dr. Gregg Narber, Assistant Professor of History at Luther College, will present *Grant Wood's Eppley Hotel Murals: A Style in Transition*. Dr. Narber will discuss the different styles with which Grant Wood experimented, including impressionism, and the way his murals for the Eppley Hotels – one of which was the Council Bluffs Chieftain Hotel – demonstrate a move from the impressionist method to his mature style, one characterized by consideration of Iowa's past. He will talk about Wood's decorative handling of components of his compositions and his reliance on photography and appropriated images rather than observed models for his works. Dr. Narber will compare the work done in Wood's "corn room" murals to his depictions in the murals of early Council Bluffs. This lecture will be held at 7:00 p.m. at the Council Bluffs Public Library. A freewill offering will be taken.

Kirn Park Update

The parks Department has given our association in regard to the Kirn stadium painting and future plans for the park. The plaque was made and framed by our very own Kyle Muscall. Larry Foster was very pleased.

I received the following email from Larry Foster to update us on the future of Kirn Park. I believe it is very exciting news.

Greetings All,

Much has been going on around Parks and Recreation – but I thought I should take a minute and give you all an update on where we are with this project:

Stadium Painting – First Coat: Great partnership project!! The first coat has been applied.

Stadium Painting – Second Coat: There had been some discussions about the Neighborhood Groups doing this. Frankly, by the time the City purchased the paint/brushes, etc. and covered the cost of staff to be there when the group could paint (which may have involved weekends), it turns out to be about as cheap for a professional to apply the last coat. A good bid was received for this and, if all goes well, the second coat will be completed today

Stadium Bench Brackets Painting: All brackets received one coat of paint. The south and middle sections received a second coat. Both these coats were applied by the Mutual employees and the Neighbors. Amount 30% of the brackets still need the second coat. I was surprised how much difference this made and glad we used the rain day to attack the brackets. Finishing the final brackets could be part of the Neighborhood Group effort, along with the next project.

Painting of the Stadium Reveal: We need to pick a color for this final element of the stadium. I believe the Neighborhood Group has volunteered to do this painting. And since this involves traditional paint in smaller containers, it can be done without City staff being there all the time. At this point, perhaps this should best be left for spring.

Bleacher Replacement: The Department has replaced those benches that were in the worst condition.

Roof on the South End of the Stadium Extension: The majority of the existing rolled sheet roofing has been torn off by vandals. The City will be installing new corrugated metal roofing as previously discussed. This will completed before winter comes.

Vandalism Camera: A pole has been added for the camera. However, we will be relocating the camera to the Black Angel for Halloween.

Football Field Improvements: Park Maintenance has inspected the field, evaluated the low spots and general turf condition and is developing an approach and cost to renovate the field.

Securing the Rear of the Stadium: Approaches have been discussed. Need to finalize how best to do this.

Master Plan: No additional meetings have been held, but it's now time to get back into this process. An initial meeting is being planned with the Consultant. This will then generate some drawings. As this process moves forward, I will contact Carol and we can get the Neighborhood Group back together for input.

Iowa West Foundation Grant: Applying for an IWF grant to complete this entire project remains a possibility. We need to complete the Master Plan and have a good feel for costs.


