## SIGNS...SIGNS...SIGNS!

We are fortunate, in addition to our wonderful neighbors; our neighborhood has so many wonderful homes. Have you ever thought "I wonder how old that house is, or who once lived there?" Soon, many of our homes will feature a wonderful hand crafted lawn sign that is being created as I write. Last year, I began collecting the signatures that will serve as the agreement between the homeowner and the Fairmount Park Neighborhood Association, allowing the sign to remain as a permanent addition to the lawn. I'll continue gathering those signatures, now that the weather is warming.

Although the following information is not new, I feel it's important to revisit. Last year, we talked about the quest for our National Historic District designation and the fact that our homes do not need to be individually listed in order to display a National register of Historic Places plaque. For the most part, the homes that receive a lawn sign would be those that are considered "individually eligible". As we discussed before, homes that are considered "individually eligible" display characteristics that would make them eligible for listing because of architectural style, a person of importance residing there, or an event of importance occurred there.

If, or shall I say, "when" our Historic District is named, those homeowners may chose to display a plaque denoting that their home is considered "Individually Eligible" as a historic property in the Park-Glen Historic District in addition to the signage that will be made for their yard. There are 20 homes that are eligible for this honor and many more homes that are considered "contributing" toward the Historic District nomination, meaning you are also eligible to display a plaque. There are countless plaque manufacturers on the web which would allow the homeowner to be as plain or as elaborate as they choose. Keeping in mind that we have 3 properties that are currently listed on the National Register of Historic Places in our Neighborhood, there are many, many more that could display a badge of honor, as well. We anxiously await the decision.

# RAMEN - BROCCOLI SLAW

Dressing:	Salad:
1/2 cup Sugar	1 bag Broccoli Slaw Mix (12oz.)
1/3 cup White Vinegar	2 pkg. Ramen noodles (3 oz.)
1/2 cup Vegetable Oil	1 small onion diced fine
	1 cup shelled roasted sunflower seeds
	1 cup slivered almonds, toasted

-For the Dressing whisk sugar and vinegar in medium bowl until Sugar dissolves.

- -Gradually whisk in vegetable oil then Flavor packets from the Ramen noodles.
- -For the salad crush the Ramen noodles and then combine with the remaining salad ingredients.
- -Drizzle dressing over the top and toss until well coated.
- -Refrigerate salad, covered, for at least 30 minutes or up to two hours.

### **PROGRESS ON NEIGHBORHOOD SIGNS**

Our artisans, Bill Mann and Bob Pashek, are progressing so fast on the 20 signs they are making that our heads are swimming. If you were to enter their shop, you would be in awe at the sight of all the sign parts setting about in various stages of painting, lettering and assembly. Colors have been adjusted and re-adjusted by Bill, and, after choosing the lettering style, Bob has been painstakingly cutting out each letter. They have devised an ingenious way of placing the letters on each sign (tedious work). Bill spends so much time on his lathe that he doesn't even have time to talk, and that alone is an event worth noting, perhaps as a new national holiday. But, seriously, we will be very proud of their work and the homes that these signs commemorate, once this project is completed. We estimate that they will be ready and installed sometime in July.

### LITTER, LITTER, EVERYWHERE

After this winter ended, we were left with the memory of all that snow and cold—and now we see all the litter that was left behind once spring arrived. We are cooperating with Keep Council Bluffs Beautiful by picking up the litter in our neighborhood and the surrounding parks. The city has provided us with the trash bags and will pick up the full ones on Monday, April 19<sup>th</sup>. We are not having a party event for this clean-up but, rather, each person who takes a trash bag or two will be on their own to grab that trash out of the streets and in the parks and will take their full bags to the empty lot on Glen located right behind John's yellow house on Park (it is his vacant lot and it no longer has a street number, so we are trusting that you all know where it is—remember last year's dumpsters and you will nail it). Please don't put your bags there until the afternoon/evening of April 18<sup>th</sup> because John doesn't want raccoons and other critters to have many days to work over those bags before they are picked up.

#### THE LAST WORD

We only have a few tidbits left, promise. Your Board has been hard at work planning and deciding stuff, trying to earn the salaries they have been paid. One important decision was to file for our 501(c)3 IRS nonprofit designation now rather than later. There are long and complicated reasons for making that decision but we felt we were justified in spending the \$400 now for this filing. Forty flower baskets will soon be appearing on some of the utility poles throughout the district, and thanks to Michelle for arranging for this donation from Dallas Johnson and also for propagating vines to fill in around the geraniums. Our first Yard of the Month award will be made by the end of May and the picture of the winning yard will appear in next month's newsletter. The new street sign project being planned by the DNA and the City is progressing and may include new poles as well. Finally, we wish to thank Harvey and Terri Kunik for hosting our April meeting. They provided some wonderful food and asked a friend who plays violin in the Omaha Symphony to play background music during the meeting. It was memorable and we welcome them to our group of active participants of FPNA.

Earth Day promotes environmental awareness and calls for the protection of our planet.

## Earth Day 2010

Thursday, April 22, 2010

Earth Day is a name used for two different observances both held worldwide annually. While some people celebrate Earth Day around the time of the vernal equinox, others observe the occasion on April 22 each year. Earth Day aims to inspire awareness of and appreciation for earth's environment. It is currently observed in more than 140 countries around the world.

### What do people do?

The April 22 Earth Day is usually celebrated with outdoor performances, where individuals or groups perform acts of service to earth. Typical ways of observing Earth Day include planting trees, picking up roadside trash, conducting various programs for recycling and conservation, using recyclable containers for snacks and lunches. Some people are encouraged to sign petitions to governments, calling for stronger or immediate action to stop global warming and to reverse environmental destruction. Television stations frequently air programs dealing with environmental issues.

### **Public Life**

Earth Day is not a public holiday and public life, with regard to transport schedules and opening hours for schools and businesses, is not affected.

### Background

The April 22 Earth Day, founded by Senator Gaylord Nelson, was first organized in 1970 to promote ecology and respect for life on the planet as well as to encourage awareness of the growing problems of air, water and soil pollution.

Some people prefer to observe Earth Day around the time of the March equinox. In 1978, American anthropologist Margaret Mead added her support for the equinox Earth Day, founded by John McConnell. She stated that the selection of the March Equinox for Earth Day made planetary observance of a shared event possible.

### Symbols

Symbols used by people to describe Earth Day include: an image or drawing of planet earth; a tree, a flower or leaves depicting growth; or the recycling symbol. Colors used for Earth Day include natural colors such as green, brown or blue.

The "Earth Flag", which was designed by John McConnell, has been described as a "flag for all people". It features a two-sided dye printed image of the Earth from space on a dark blue field, made from recyclable, weather-resistant polyester. Margaret Mead believed that a flag that showed the earth as seen from space was appropriate.


### 126 Park Avenue

The Downtown Neighborhood Alliance (DNA) met at the Senior Center on April 6th. Ron Abdouch of the Neighborhood Center was a guest and announced a new volunteer program in which the NC will be partnering with a large metropolitan corporation to furnish volunteers and expenses for helping neighborhoods in both Council Bluffs and Omaha. Applications to be included in this program are due by May 5 and any work will be done during September.

Sandy Hull of Keep Council Bluffs Beautiful was also a guest and explained the various programs the City is doing to participate in the clean-up campaign this spring. Olde Towne NA (formerly known as Government Center NA) will hold a community picnic this spring, date to be announced.

The street sign project is moving forward but it was decided to include the costs of poles to hold the new street signs into the process, the thoughts being that new signs should be hung on new poles for uniformity throughout the historic neighborhoods.

The three proposed designs for DNA logo were further discussed; one design was chosen but with suggested modifications to lettering and background.

We'll be adding a bit of trailing greenery, a baggie to the bottom of the pot and a shot of time-release fertilizer; however rest assured they'll be up for Mother's Day! In case those of you on Grandview were worried, yes, we have some for you too. With the expansion of the neighborhood boundary and membership, we expanded our request for baskets to 40, and they agreed!

BASKETS

These flowers are going to be used to the Taj-Mahal treatment that Dallas Johnson provides and although I'll be around to water them; they have been used to drip irrigation and being watered several times a day, so feel free to water them yourself. We can't over-water them! When the water immediately runs out the bottom, they are DRY! (This is because the water is running out between the dry soil and the pot.) And disregard the rain, most of the rainwater never makes in into the soil. So grab your neighbor and start planning. Some of our best baskets have been cared for by several neighbors at once.
