By now, everyone knows that our nomination to be one of Council Bluffs' historic neighborhoods has been approved by the National Park Service and we are officially on the National Register of Historic Places. But does everyone know how much hard work, blood and treasure have gone into making this a reality? Okay, skip the blood part, but certainly the hard work and treasure are true statements. The City of Council Bluffs, Iowa West Foundation, and the Council Bluffs Historic Preservation Alliance have been working toward this goal for several years. The CBHPA has held countless tours and dinners in some of our finest historic homes to earn their share of the money it took to make this a reality. Iowa West Foundation and the City ponied up big chunks of money because they thought it was important to get our neighborhood on the NRHP. They hired the Tall Grass Historians who spent hours and hours researching history and abstracts, with the invaluable assistance of our own Mary Lou McGinn. The list goes on.

We thank everyone involved in making it possible for our neighborhood to receive this honor. We will do our best to live up to what should be expected of any recipient of an NRHP designation.

#### **PROCLAMATION**

We thought proclamations were things that Abraham Lincoln read from some prominent balcony in any town he visited, but, no, even our own Mayor Hanafan can read one—and he did so at a recent City Council meeting. This proclamation detailed the reasons why we received the NRHP designation and it was so interesting that our Mayor has promised to read it to all of us at our next meeting on May  $22^{nd}$  (details below). 

# THE LETTER

209 Park Avenue

Thomas Tostevin was a Quaker whose family had migrated to the United States from Guernsey, one of the islands south of Great Britain. After living in a Quaker community in New York State, he eventually moved with his family to Salem, Henry County, Iowa, a place largely composed of Quakers. He and his brother, Albert, continued their westward journey by relocating to Council Bluffs, where they both served as civil engineers. Thomas became a prominent citizen of Council Bluffs, serving in several public capacities, including that of Mayor.

Thomas married Harriet Gibbs, also a Quaker, in 1852 and they moved to Council Bluffs in 1854. They lived for many years at 209 Park Ave. and may have built the house there, although that is not known for certain. It has been rumored for decades that Abraham Lincoln spoke from the front porch of this residence when he visited Council Bluffs in 1859, but who can really know.

Fast forward to the 1930's when the Elder family lived at 209. One of their many children, Rose Marie, found several newspapers from the 1850's, which had been stashed away somewhere in the house, and among these precious papers was a letter written in 1854 by Lucinda Gibbs to her daughter Harriet. Aunt Rose Marie wrapped the letter in aluminum foil and kept the treasure for decades, until she gave it to her niece Connie, who unwrapped the foil and tried to read the damaged letter, puzzling over who these folks were and how they could be related to her. It is amazing how one thing will lead to another and Connie's genealogical research showed her that none of them were actually related to her but were, instead, intimately connected with this historic home.

Although this letter has been damaged and is very hard to decipher, it looks like it was a prayerful and wistful letter to daughter Harriet from her mother Lucinda, when she and Thomas left Salem for their new life in Council Bluffs. One thing is clear—that mother Lucinda never expected to see her daughter or her grandchildren ever again. What would be a simple day trip today, would have been nearly impossible for a lone Quaker woman in 1854.

Reading this letter makes you think about real life nearly 160 years ago. Perhaps "the good old days" were better in hindsight than they were in actual time.


