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THE POWER OF GLUE


ften folks look back to the past, even the recent past, and think of those days as "the good old days," but were they? Before 2007, the idea of a neighborhood association was just that, an idea. Did we really need one? And why?

Think back, for instance, to that time when we were trying to get the City Council to re-zone our neighborhood to R-1 from its R-2 and R-3 status. There were many reasons why we failed, but one of them was that we didn't speak with one voice. We were asked point blank whether or not we had a neighborhood association and the answer was that we did not. Clearly, something had to be done.

Enter the early crusaders with their far-sighted vision. Yes, their vision was clear and they were armed with expert legal help, but, even so, agreements were hard to come by. Compromises had to be made before the by-laws could be written and ratified by the membership. The resulting document conforms to the requirements of the State of Iowa and has officially been filed with them. Then, when we obtained our 501(c)3 tax exempt status with the IRS, we had further requirements to meet. Let's make it clear—these requirements do not allow us to become an enforcing body of any kind.

By majority agreement we cannot tell anyone what color to paint their house, or how often to cut their grass, or what style of garden shed they must place in their yards—nothing like that. What we can do is find ways to cause historic signs to be made which are the jewels of the neighborhood; arrange for much needed sidewalk repair which benefits everyone; organize people into cleaning crews to remove the unsightly trash from parks, streets and sidewalks; maintain

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Mayor's Neighborhood Cabinet Notes

-Community Development Block Grants (CDBGs) will probably be cut, but don't know the amount yet

- -These grants are used to rehab homes and for housing projects, and the City may lose staff in this area due to cuts
- -New highway bill from the state includes cuts to the program
 - -Likely to extend the life of the interstate projects in Council Bluffs (Interstates 80 and 29)
- -Commercial property taxes
 - -Projected \$20 million in losses if Governor Branstad's plan goes through
 - -Right now there are also different proposals from house and senate in addition to Governor Branstad's plan
- -There will be changes in this area, just don't know what yet -36% casino gaming tax proposal from still on the board from Governor Branstad
- -Current City budget not likely to be affected by state changes, but budget changes would be likely for next year
- -Outdoor dining proposal for downtown in C-3 and C-4 zones only
- –Urban farming/community garden proposed on the corner of Broadway & N $1_{\rm st}$ by Broadway Methodist Church
 - -City Council is looking into other possible locations in the area due to traffic density in the area
- -Old Holiday Inn off of Nash Blvd is gone and most of the trees have also been removed
 - -City has put \$415,000 into this site, total investment will probably reach \$1 million
 - -Future site plans are still in the works
- -Preserve CB organized a cleanup for a vacant home on the corner of Kanesville and North 1 Street
 - -Lincoln/Fairview Neighborhood Association)
 - -This is believed to be the oldest home in the neighborhood and different organizations are looking to preserve and restorethe home/property
- -The City is considering natural gas docking station for City vehicles, buses, cabs, and would even be open to personal vehicles
 - Too expensive to convert current vehicles to natural gas, but may start to purchase new natural gas vehicles when older models are replaced
- -City is in the process of submitting a grant request to the Iowa West Foundation combining Fairview Cemetery and Kirn Park renovations
