COUNCIL UPDATE CITY

The month of April was a busy time on the City You should soon see the improvements to Fairview Council. First of all, to date we have received \$4.25 million in reimbursement from the Federal government in flood-related expenses. We reasonably expect this number to rise to approximately \$10 million by the end many who made our City what it is today, but also is the of June. expansion by Google, which will bring into the City land all the way to the Mills County border. This land will now be ripe for increased high-tech development, which increases our tax base and quality jobs opportunities for our residents.

With regard to potential regulation of satellite dishes, we have decided not to take up the issue until the courts have decided challenges to municipal regulations in other cities in the country. In short, a threat of litigation by the satellite dish companies has convinced us to allow the cities with existing regulations to bear the costs of finding out whether it is permissible for us even to consider regulating them. It seems sensible to wait to see if we can even regulate them, before deciding if it is a good idea to do so.

Urban gardening is now officially here. Backyard gardens at people's houses, as well as the backyards of places such as churches, remain exempt from regulation. What this new ordinance does is allow folks to seek a permit to garden in other places, including currently vacant City lots. Before this ordinance, gardening in those places was not allowed by City Code. An important thing to keep in mind is that adjoining property owners and neighborhood associations have to provide consent to any proposed garden subject to the ordinance, otherwise the garden cannot happen. In other words, neighborhoods have gained yet another power over their own area of our City.

Many cities have had to cut funding to their parks, but we have maintained adequate funding for your public spaces. It is very important for our residents to have good, quality places to play, particularly with their children. A good quality of life is key to keeping our people, particularly our talented young people.

150th Anniversary

445 Glen Avenue pril, One Hundred Fifty Years Ago, during the Civil War, thousands of Iowans were camped in Corinth Mississippi. They were heroes. They were also prisoners of war.

The Battle of Shiloh was fought on the 6th and 7th of April. The Confederate attack caught the Union army, including the 3rd, 6th, 7th, 11th, 15th, and 16th Iowa infantry regiments, completely by surprise. Smaller units had to fight on their own until higher officers figured out what was going on. As a result, a twodivision chunk of the army, containing those Iowa regiments, was cut off. After fighting with great bravery all day, they were eventually forced to surrender. We know now that these men did a lot to save their entire army. Their stand stalled the Confederate attack, helping the army to survive and win the next day. But 150 years ago, as you read this, thousands of Iowa soldiers didn't know if they were heroes or not. They were disarmed, under guard, on very short rations (as was the defeated Confederate army), mourning the loss of many friends and generally wondering what was next. For most of them, what came next was a journey to improvised POW camps in Macon, GA; Montgomery AL, or Selma AL.

Fortunately, for many of them, things turned out well. Union and Confederate governments worked out the details of a POW exchange. In June of 1862 some 2000 privates were sent north on parole, anticipating their exchange. These Iowa soldiers re-entered Union lines by way of Huntsville and Nashville.
