1/2 teaspoon garlic pepper
1/2 cup milk, or as needed
1 large tomato, chopped
1 (4.25 ounce) can sliced black olives
1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

- -Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Stir in rotini pasta and cook for 10 to 12 minutes or until al dente; drain.
- -Place bacon in a skillet over medium-high heat and cook until evenly brown. Drain and chop.
- -In a large bowl, mix mayonnaise, ranch dressing mix, garlic powder, and garlic pepper.
- -Stir in milk until smooth. Place bacon, tomato, black olives and cheese in bowl and toss to coat with dressing.
- -Cover and chill at least 1 hour in the refrigerator.

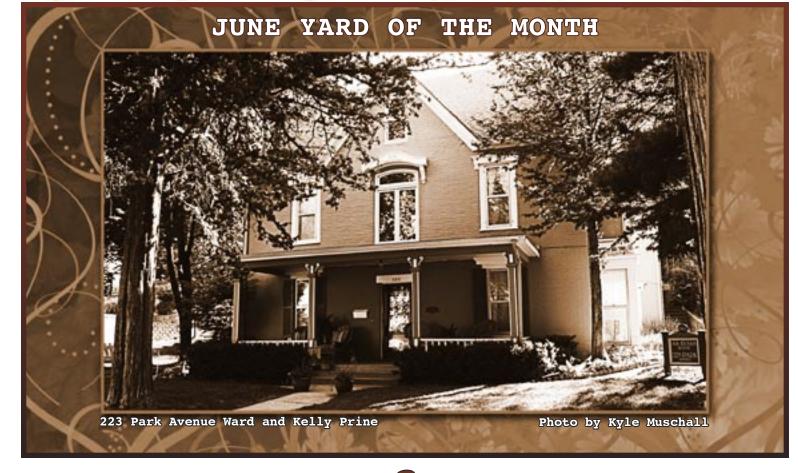
The President's Corner
