DO YOU KNOW THE SYMPTOMS

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms. Here are three easy questions to ask:

S: Ask the person to SMILE.

T: Ask the person to TALK and speak a simple sentence coherently.

R: Ask the person to RAISE both arms.

And here is a new sign of a stroke:

Ask the person to STICK OUT HIS/HER TONGUE. If the tongue is crooked (goes to one side or the other), this is also a sign of a Stroke.

If the person has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call 911 immediately!!

THANKSGIVING FUN FACTS

-The Plymouth Pilgrims were the first to celebrate the Thanksgiving.

-The Pilgrim leader, Governor William Bradford, had organized the first Thanksgiving feast in 1621. He invited the neighboring Wampanoag Indians to the feast.

-Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey to be the national bird of the United States.

-Sarah Josepha Hale, an American magazine editor, persuaded Abraham Lincoln to declare Thanksgiving a national holiday. She is also the author of the popular nursery rhyme "Mary Had a Little Lamb"

-Since 1947, the National Turkey Federation has presented a live turkey and two dressed turkeys to the President. The President does not eat the live turkey. He "pardons" it and allows it to live out its days on a historical farm.

-In the US, about 280 million turkeys are sold for the Thanksgiving celebrations.

-The average weight of a turkey purchased at Thanksgiving is 15 pounds.

-The heaviest turkey ever raised was 86 pounds, about the size of a large dog.


-Turkey has more protein than chicken or beef.

Pioneer Life Program

A verbal picture of pioneer life in Southwest Iowa painted by those who actually lived it is the topic of the final program of the Historical Society of Pottawattamie County's 2012 speakers series.

The firsthand accounts are taken from letters and reminiscences of our area's early settlers, Civil War soldiers, and abolitionists. The lecture will be presented by author and historian James Patrick Morgans Sunday, November 18, in the auditorium of the Western Historic Trials Center (3434 Richard Downing Ave).

The program will start at 2 pm. Mr. Morgans is the author of three history books that explore the early times of Southwest Iowa. His newest is "Letters and Reminiscences from the Iowa Frontier: John Todd and the Tabor Colony 1850-1865."

In addition to his books he has written over 150 magazine articles for a variety of publications including the Omaha World-Herald, Farm Journal, and Iowa Heritage Illustrated. Following the program, a book signing will be held for Mr. Morgan's latest book. The program is free and open to the public. am is free and open to the public.

FPNA ON LINE!!


