As Sharon has mentioned in her article we're waiting for the CURB grant announcements after February 1st and then we plan to conclude the third and final phase of the identification pole projects. This will hopefully give us an additional four poles for a total of 15 locations spaced throughout the entire FPNA area at our entrances and key locations.

HEATING SYSTEM TIPS AND TOOLS

Space heating is the largest single energy user in most homes, accounting for 42 percent of residential energy use, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. While upgrading to a new, energy-efficient heating system is the best way to lower your winter energy bills; the following are six things you can do throughout your home to save money and improve the comfort of your family by increasing the efficiency of your current system.

-Maintain your system. Have your heating system cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional before the start of each heating season. Make sure a clean filter is in place and replace it according to manufacturer's guidelines.

-Increase insulation. Poorly insulated homes waste money and are less comfortable. Make sure your home is insulated according to recommended levels. Inspect the insulation in your attic and check the R-value. Evaluating wall insulation is more difficult. Shut off power to an outlet and check behind it to measure the thickness of the insulation in the wall. An insulation contractor can conduct a thorough analysis.

-Close the gaps. Openings around attic joists, electrical lines, and plumbing and gas pipes that enter from outdoors can result in significant air leakage. Seal these areas with a do-it-yourself spray foam insulation product.

-Weatherize doors and windows. Check for gaps around exterior doors and install weather stripping if needed. Inspect windows for cracked or missing caulk and re-caulk if necessary. Weather stripping and caulk are available at your local hardware or home improvement store.

-Seal air ducts. Over time, ducts can develop leaks, holes and poor connections. In areas you can reach, seal all ductwork with mastic or metal tape. Insulate ductwork in unheated areas, such as attics and crawlspaces. Contact a heating professional if you suspect more serious ductwork problems.

-Use window treatments. During the day, open shades and curtains on south-facing walls to let in the warming sunlight. Close them at night to help keep in warm air.

A home energy audit is a great way to identify opportunities for improving the performance of your heating system and the energy efficiency of your entire home. An energy auditor will perform a blower door test, an infrared inspection and other tests to locate areas in your home where energy is being wasted.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

AAA recommends the following Winter Driving Tips:

-Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.

-Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.

-Make certain your tires are properly inflated.

-Never mix radial tires with other tire types.

-Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-up.

-If possible, avoid using your parking brake in cold, rainy and snowy weather.

-Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).

-Always look and steer where you want to go.

-Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle.

-Check the weather forecast and road conditions before embarking on a trip.

-Always maintain a reasonable speed and safe following distance from the vehicle in front of you

-Be aware that ramps, bridges and overpasses may occasionally freeze before other roadway segments

-Turn on lights to see and be seen. Keep head and tail lights clear of snow

-Don't drive through "white out" conditions. Be patient, wait it out and travel safely.



C.B.P.D CITIZENS POLICE ACADEMY

Did you ever wonder what is involved in a case that goes to the detectives or what it feels like to fire a police-weapon. What it is like to be in a dark building and look for a burglar or go on call and make the call to arrest someone. Here is your chance to do all those things and more. On February 27th, 2014 the Council Bluffs Police Department will hold the 2014 Citizens' Police Academy. There is no cost to take the class, and you must be 18 years old at the start of the class.

The Council Bluffs Police Department's Citizens' Police Academy program is designed to promote and enhance citizen understanding and become familiar with the various facets of the Council Bluffs Police Department's role in the criminal justice system, and the daily tasks of law enforcement officers.

The objective of the course is not to prepare graduates to become police officers, but instead, to instill in citizens a greater general knowledge of the many functions of the Council Bluffs Police Department. The program is a 13-week course, the classes that are held on Thursday generally run from 6:30PM until 9:30PM at the Southwest Iowa Law Enforcement Training Facility. Classes are taught by Council Bluffs police officers.

Super Bowl Crescent Pizza Pockets

1 (8 ounce) can refrigerated crescent dinner rolls

1/4 cup pizza sauce

3/4 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

1/2 cup sliced pepperoni

1 teaspoon grated Parmesan cheese

-Heat oven to 375 degrees F.

- Unroll dough on cookie sheet and separate into 4 rectangles; press each into 6x4-inch rectangle, firmly pressing perforations to seal.

-Spread 1 tablespoon pizza sauce on half of each rectangle to within 1 inch of edge.

-Sprinkle each with 3 tablespoons cheese; top with 6 slices pepperoni. Fold dough diagonally over filling

-Firmly press edges with fork to seal.

-Sprinkle each triangle with 1/4 teaspoon grated cheese.

-With fork, prick top of each to allow steam to escape.

-Bake 13 to 15 minutes or until deep golden brown. Serve warm.

RESTORE OMAHA 2014

Where can you get ideas on how to make compatible additions and renovations to an older home? How do you repair an old window to make it more energy efficient? Where can you tour and hear about restoration projects happening now in Omaha? At the ninth annual Restore Omaha Conference, Saturday, March 1, at Metropolitan Community College's South Campus, 27th and Q Streets.
