Another Kirn Park item, the Kirn Park entrance art signs are complete. I'm sure you've seen them progress over the last two months and they look phenomenal. The art signs are part of the "Art in the Park" project that was headed up by the C.B. Parks Department, partly funded by Iowa West and had great participation from the C.B. Residents in providing input on what they wanted to see in their parks.

I had the opportunity to talk with the artist Sean R. Ward who designed and built the signs for the Kirn Park portion of the project. Sean is originally from Long Island New York and attended the Kansas City Art Institute in his school days. Each of the signs has over four and a half yards of concrete. That is a lot of cement. The 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue sign goes deep enough that it hits the old brick road. The signs are faced with a hexagonal un-glazed tile that was popular between 1880 and 1940. I'm sure a lot of you recognize the tile as you probably have some of it in your home as I do. The edges are fitted with a brass rail and the design that is painted on the tile for the lettering and flower motif is a weather resistant glaze. The signs really do fit the period of the neighborhood, as if they were built at the same time as the park. My hat off to the artist for delivering a piece that is not only inspiring but will last for many generations.

# FRONT DOORS: WHAT THEY SAY

Our front door, its color or lack of color, goes far to make that all-important first impression of our home. Maybe we've painted it our favorite color of orange or tropical fruit without giving it another thought except that we love the color. According to experts, though, colors have meanings and can evoke moods. I recently read a story that purports to explain it all and that inspired me to survey our neighborhood to see if we conform to current trends. Here are some of the colors and what they mean:

**RED**, one of the most popular color choices for front doors, is considered welcoming and inviting. Early American settlers set the trend for RED because it meant that weary travelers would be welcomed to stop and rest. But, in Scotland a RED front door meant the homeowners had paid off their mortgage. Confusing. It is the third most popular choice here, with twenty-seven doors showing various shades of this color.

**WHITE** is a classic color for front doors and has represented purity, virtue and serenity. It is a popular color for cottages, of which we have many. Forty-five of our doors sport this color.

**BLUE** is a popular choice as it is thought to bring lots of positive energy into a space. LIGHT BLUE represents ease and harmony in relationships. We enjoy eight BLUE doors here, but only one of them is LIGHT BLUE. Hmmm.

**GREEN** is the color of renewal and wealth, representing balance, peace, compassion, growth and harmony. There are eight GREEN doors here.

**PURPLE** is thought to invite many opportunities into the home. It encourages a fresh perspective and also represents royalty. There are three actual PURPLE doors in our neck of the woods, and one LILAC, one PINK and one FUSCHIA (which I consider a variation of purple).

**BLACK** front doors command attention and project sophistication and authority. We only have two BLACK doors around here, so what does that tell you?

Other colors represented in our neighborhood, for which I have no explanations, are TAN, SALMON, BROWN, TURQUOISE, and CHARTREUSE. Who are these folks who dare to be different? Are they just like you and me? Who knows?

I have left the most popular choice for front doors to last. Far and away the most popular treatment for our front doors is UNPAINTED WOOD, with sixty-five doors appearing this way. It could be that the old house devotees among us can't or won't touch their doors with anything but polythurethane. Maybe they're right, but that purple door trimmed in metallic gold still speaks to me.








## THE POWER TO STAY SAFE

MidAmerican Energy Company has recently received calls about scams occurring in its service territory. Many of the scams originate with a telephone call to a MidAmerican Energy customer.

Reports indicate the suspicious callers pose as MidAmerican Energy employees and tell customers they are behind on their utility bills or need equipment repairs and have a short time to make a payment to keep their utility service on. The customers are told to purchase a "Green Dot" or other prepaid debit card and call back with the serial number of the card to avoid having their electricity or natural gas shut off. These calls may show up on caller ID as if they were coming from MidAmerican Energy.

#### **BE AWARE!**

MidAmerican Energy customer service will NEVER request that you purchase a Green Dot or any other prepaid debit card to pay your bill.

MidAmerican Energy customer service will not request your account number. The company has that information on file.

Do not provide your account number, credit card information or any personal information to an unknown or suspicious caller.

If you receive a call asking you to provide personal information or buy and make a payment using a prepaid debit card, hang up the phone. Immediately call MidAmerican Energy at 888-427-5632. Do not use any phone numbers provided by an unknown caller. Help Spread the Word: Tell your friends and family about the scam, so they don't become the next victim.
